Deepavali

Deepavali is also known as Diwali - The Festival of Lights.

For Hindus worldwide, the celebration of Deepavali revolves around the triumph of good over evil, purity over impurity, and light over darkness. It is one of the most important Hindu festivals.

The Festival of Lights takes place on the darkest night (the first night of the new moon) in the month of Kartik in the Hindu calendar. In their homes, people light small oil lamps called diyas. It is believed that deceased relatives come back to visit their families on Earth during this festival, and the lights are a way to guide the spirits home. The sound of firecrackers exploding is common as the noise is said to drive away evil spirits.

This year, Deepavali falls on 12 November, Sunday. It will be replaced on 13 November, Monday as a public holiday. We will be celebrating on 14 November, Tuesday. Please let your child come to school in the traditional Indian costume, any traditional costume or home clothes.

Every year, one of the activities will be having henna art on their hands. Henna arts symbolises health, luck and positive energy for Diwali and the New Year.
